



THE BEAST and Mayfield, Kentucky

Historic. Unprecedented. Catastrophic.

You've seen my church in Mayfield, KY on TV. It's was a focal point for TV camera crews reporting on the devastation caused by the tornado I refer to as, "The Beast." It hit Mayfield at 9:25pm, central time, Friday, December 10, 2021. The tornado made news around the world for weeks. The TV crew probably told you it was a church, otherwise you would not have known what that pile of rubble was. I certainly didn't and I was looking for it on the news coverage. The huge open arch that appears to be an entrance was actually an irreplaceable, beautiful stained glass window.



I lived in Mayfield for almost 20 years and I learned the drill in dealing with tornadoes. Over the years Western Kentucky had become part of Tornado Alley and I had become used to tornadoes dropping in. Many did come too close for comfort, several times touching ground within a mile of "my old Kentucky home." One year one hovered over an elementary school while below my grandchildren sheltered in an interior school hallway. Several years ago one touched down only football fields away from a middle school and the lined-up school buses. Enough close calls to know they were real and dangerous.

This one was different. Tornadoes are usually about 250 feet across, blowing around 110 miles/hour. They drop, maybe touch down for about 30 seconds, skip around another 30 seconds and then dissipate in a few minutes. They do their damage and the worst of the storm moves on east.

This one was really different. Unprecedented. Instead of being 250 feet across and travelling a few miles, this beast was ½ mile to a mile wide and stayed on the ground for a journey of 250 miles start to finish, 165 miles just in KY alone. Even a dozen miles is considered extreme. The EF4 winds blew at 190 miles/hour. Six states in the United States' heartland were impacted. It stayed along that 250 mile path of countryside farms and small towns already barely holding on, struggling with unemployment and poverty. Birthed in Arkansas, it lived for 24 hours and 11 minutes and hit Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Tennessee and finally died in central Kentucky. It spawned a family of 69 tornadoes. It lifted debris up to 30,000 feet in the air, the cruising altitude of airplanes. The beast destroyed an estimated 15,000 structures. The sheer magnitude is breathtaking.

One miracle is that, with no one missing, in all those states, only a total of 91 dead, with 77 of those in Kentucky. It was feared that number alone would be under the collapsed Candle Factory in Mayfield. Only 21 dead in Graves County in which Mayfield is located. Only.

Ninety-six years ago, on March 18, 1925, a similar Tri-State cluster resulted in an estimated 700 dead and over 2,000 injured. That storm started in Missouri and traveled east as storms normally do in the Mississippi Valley. They called it a tornado. During the years since, builders, storm chasers, weather fore-

casters and governments would get better and better at identifying tornadoes and notifying their populace to get out of harm's way, go to a safe place.

Safer places were being built. Warnings now are routine with sirens, radio, TV, and group emergency telephone calls with standard instructions of going to a safe place, like basements. With its water table, however, basements in Western Kentucky are rare. When I experienced my first siren tornado warning, I was told I should have gone to the south-westernmost corner of my house or to an internal bathroom with no windows with its "plumbing reinforced" walls. Get in the bathtub. Cover with a mattress and blankets to shield from flying debris. And stay there until the sirens indicated the danger had passed. A bathtub? Really?

On that Friday, in an rural area in Kentucky, a hillside park of trailer homes was destroyed. There was no strong building around, like a church, so they had nowhere to go other than stay in their bathrooms. A grandmother babysitting a 3 month old and a toddler put them in the bathtub, covered them and hung on. The tub was ripped out of the trailer, tossed and dropped "upended" in the nearby field. Searching neighbors heard the babies crying and found them, now shielded by the same tub, with only scratches and bruises. No deaths on that hillside that night.

Another family in a Missouri town was not so lucky. Their 9 year old daughter was one of 3 children in a bathtub. A picture of them in the tub with the 9 year old smiling and holding her doll, taken minutes before the Beast blew their home apart, is heartbreaking. Within minutes of that smiling picture, she was dead.

In Illinois, a family and friends scrambled into a below ground storm shelter buried years ago. They jammed themselves tightly into the small space. The men helped hold the rattling door closed by hanging onto it while their homes, just feet away, were being blown away to the foundation. They lived.

Meanwhile Mayfield's entire town center did sustain the most damage. Businesses, neighborhood after neighborhood were leveled. Their immediate concern was the 110 night shift workers at the Candle Factory, the area's third largest employer. The entire factory was flattened to the ground. About 40 were accounted for pretty quickly but fears were high for another 70,

assumed buried under tons of rubble. Removing cars that had been tossed on top as well as the heavy steel beams without crushing those underneath was now the danger. And underneath, crying and screaming victims waited hours, cold, wet, injured, scared, using cell phones to direct rescuers, most of whom were husbands, brothers and fellow workers who had come to be as close as family. Victims held hands to encourage each other to hold on. Literally, one rescued in time, one not. A total of eight were found dead.



It took some time but eventually they found that among the unaccounted for, some left around 9:00pm when they heard "Mayfield. It's coming for you." The rest had gotten themselves out and scattered to find what was left of their own homes and families. With no electric, no phones and no internet for days, information was slow in coming back. The 70 feared dead were alive.

You know how it is, TV weather forecasts come on and it's rarely that bad and certainly not everywhere. Tornado Watches are common and storms come and go. The most serious from Paducah Weather was at 6:00pm, 3 hours before the Beast struck. The one at 9:00pm was the most alarming. "Life threatening!

Buildings, homes and businesses will be destroyed. Mayfield, It's coming for you." This was not a Tornado Watch. This was a Tornado Warning. That was a big difference. This was a monster tornado.

At 9:25pm central time, it was too late for anyone not sheltered in a safe place. Fortunately, most had heeded the warnings. One family with a strong house and a basement is still sheltering 26 in her home, cooking outdoors using several grills, heating with a wood fire place.

Meanwhile, in Pittsburgh, PA, my daughter Julie and I were following the alerts. Julie and her Mayfield friend were texting back and forth as they normally did. Her friend wasn't paying much attention and was already getting ready for bed. Julie texted, "Get in the basement now. An F4 is on the ground." We waited. Ten minutes later, her friend, Paula, texted back. "We're alive but our house is gone." By this time they had probably also heard the described "10 freight trains" coming. They didn't have time to get to the basement. Paula, her husband and their dogs hid in the first floor bathroom. Paula acknowledged that it was 30 seconds after she read my daughter's text that they made the decision to take action. 30 seconds. A text.

My daughter's ex-husband's main medical building was damaged beyond repair. The second floor was gone. The separate buildings were gone. Leveled. Shredded. I looked for them in pictures. They had disappeared. You saw that on TV too because it was directly across the street from another big church, destroyed.

The town's Emergency Communications Center was knocked out of commission. The town's courthouse, city hall, post office, police station, jail, one fire station, ambulances – the town's entire infrastructure damaged, most likely beyond repair. Well-constructed banks, businesses, churches. Rubble.

No electric, no gas, no water, for an unknown period of time, in the winter - an entire town.

What has Mayfield done?

For a small, very diverse, close knit town of about 10,000 residents, an amazing job. Spontaneously. This was catastrophic and they knew it.

Safety first with electric and gas shut off due to hissing gas lines and electric lines down everywhere. The water tower had already toppled and spilled its water washing away a nearby resident, amazingly to a safer place. Roads were cleared to make way for emergency vehicles from surrounding areas already showing up. First responders and neighbors immediately looked for those trapped under rubble and behind walls. The injured, cold, wet and in pain, waited hours for ambulances that had to come from other communities. But they did come.

Fortunately, the region's Jackson Purchase Hospital and walk-in clinic located on the edge of town survived intact, well equipped with generators. Those with cars still drivable got there on their own. The old original hospital in the town's center, destroyed.

Social media, Facebook and texting kept people connected and informed.

TV crews showed up and over weeks spread the message.

First responders showed up. The National Guard showed up for search and rescue, clearing homes for survivors or deceased. President Biden showed up. Samaritans Purse showed up. Since they estimate at least 1,000 damaged or destroyed homes and buildings, insurance companies set up shop to process claims. FEMA showed up and will be there a very long time.

Kentucky state parks accepted the displaced into their lodges, without charge. Volunteer organizations went to them with donated clothes and supplies. Surrounding hotels are full, many bills paid by donations. Those with damaged but drivable cars left to stay with friends and relatives. Less than a quarter mile made the difference between destruction and minor wind damage. My previous home was on the "other side" of that thin dividing line. No damage.

Construction workers and farmers, cooks and crooks showed up Volunteers from the surrounding farms and countryside showed up quickly with their equipment, knowing what was needed and without being asked. Any equipment that could push, pull, cut, dig, pick up or carry. Big construction and farm equipment was needed along with trucks to remove the heavy roof, steel beams, cars, and walls from the flattened building at the Candle

Factory as well as the overwhelming number of roofs and walls that trapped people inside their homes, if they even had part of a home left. Blue plastic tarps everywhere now serving as protection against future normal storms and winter cold.



Volunteers worked at every task, including moving and separating debris for curbside pickup. Professional crews with professional equipment donated their time and expertise as their part in helping the community. Volunteers made the difference. It's getting the town through the immediate crisis. But volunteers do leave and go home. This is just the beginning of years of work to rebuild a whole town. Their dedication and resilience are inspiring.

As for the crooks, fortunately, the good guys way outnumber the bad guys. But crooks, scammers and looters showed up as well, with some arrested. Damaged vehicles being towed became suspicious for a good reason, also resulting in arrests. Looters are the most hurtful, taking what little of value remained from traumatized people who lost everything. Facebook groups posted warnings. The most effective were curfews and limiting vehicles in the affected area to locals as well as personally going door to door delivering food and water, checking for needs

and passing out information about getting help. Looky Loos were limited to avoid gridlock on the roads.

Cooked food, free, even delivered to homes, became the norm. With so many damaged cars, many survivors were left completely dependent upon others bringing food and supplies, as well as meals to them. Not only local churches and groups sprang into action but also volunteers from other states. They showed up, completely self-contained, needing only a convenient spot to cook and hand out fresh food and water to all comers. Groups that cooked at fairs and festivals packed up their tents, cookers and showed up. Food trucks were gassed up and driven to town ready to cook their specialty. One disaster relief organization provided over 70,000 meals before their truck caravan returned to home base. All free.

Southerners are known for good cooking and the hamburgers, hotdogs, chicken, barbeque, beans and cornbread on those grills and cookers looked mighty good. Served by cooks proud of their cooking skills, along with a dash of love and a sincere "bless your heart." The commission to "Feed the Hungry" was being fulfilled by multiple thousands of a good heart. No one had to go hungry, at least for now.

Churches and the Graves County/Mayfield Fairground buildings on the outskirts of town became distribution centers for receiving and distributing everything free, food, water, clothing, diapers, tarps. All the daily needs that were blown away or destroyed. Other small towns experienced the same destruction, but because they didn't make the news, it took longer to receive needed donations. Mayfield redirected large truck loads from other states to those who could distribute the donations. Many set up community rooms with items organized like a store, with no cash registers!

Christmas was coming and donated toys were plentiful for the traumatized children. Wow! One person spent well over \$100,000 in Walmart, for toys.

Facebook pages were dedicated to finding and returning pets and property, including pictures blown hundreds of miles away.

My church, seen around the world on TV, was the oldest church of Mayfield, established in 1832. Its huge two story community Ministry Center building in the back was itself often used as an emergency center and would have been a "go to safe place" during recovery operations. Destroyed.

Not a large congregation but a warm, friendly church that was a pillar in the community. Open for daily AA and NA meetings. Boy Scouts. A kind church where they, along with other churches, cooperated with each other to meet the needs of the community. There was always a local church open on a Saturday to get a free, home cooked meal. My church was one of them for one Saturday a month.

What is their plan?

Like the rest of Mayfield, they are still in shock, taking care of the tasks at hand because this is who they are. This was a wellcared for church. Generations had taken care of every nook and cranny. How do you stop taking care, not only of the church buildings and church family, but also of the community which they have done for their entire existence of almost 200 years?

First they, along with the entire community, will continue to grieve. Even those of us who moved away, grieve with them. We sat in the pews, walked the steps and ate many meals in fellowship there. We feel the pain but they have the burden, so they still have the job. They'll say goodbye to the buildings that have served them so well. As of this writing the steel, the walls, the bricks, the stained glass windows, now rubble, has been leveled and the lot cleared for a new beginning. The buildings were destroyed. They and their ministries were not.


